## Review of classified/withheld material: JPEL and related documents

- 1. Further to previous advice in respect of other tranches of documents, and in accordance with our appointment and instruction under the Inquiry's *Procedural protocol for review of classified information / claims to withhold information from* disclosure, we provide this advice in respect of a tranche of documents broadly related to the Joint Prioritized Effects List (JPEL) of the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF).
- 2. In short, we have reached agreement with relevant Crown agencies under paragraphs [5](a), [5](b) and [8] of the *Protocol* that, subject to redaction and where possible the provision of summaries ("gists") of redacted parts, the documents of this tranche may be published.
- 3. As with previous tranches, we have accepted claims to redaction, mitigated by gisting where possible, for the following reasons:
  - 3.1. A number of documents and parts of documents replicate or refer to the substance of procedures and/or detailed military arrangements of other countries and/or international organizations, provided to the New Zealand government in confidence; that have not been previously released; and in respect of which those countries/organizations have not given their consent. We consider for those reasons that disclosure would cause prejudice to international relations and the provision of information in confidence if disclosed.
  - 3.2. Some of those parts and also other passages in this set of documents concern the detail of military and/or intelligence-gathering procedures and practices or as with some detail of personnel numbers and related information reflect those procedures/practices that are:

- 3.2.1. Still in use by the NZDF or others;
- 3.2.2. Not in the public domain or open to reasonable inference; and
- 3.2.3. Of a kind that, if made public, would prejudice national security and/or the safety of personnel.
- 3.3. Some parts of documents contain intelligence information obtained by undisclosed and sensitive means and/or sources, where disclosure of the information would disclose, or would materially risk disclosing, those means/sources and so prejudice national security; international relations; and/or safety. In some instances, it has been possible to convey much of the content without such prejudicial disclosure; in others, we have accepted that it is necessary to withhold the relevant passage altogether.
- 3.4. We have agreed to withholding of the names and other details of some individuals, which would unduly prejudice those individuals' privacy and in some cases safety if disclosed.
- 3.5. We have also agreed to redaction of references to operations, personnel and other matters outside the scope of the Inquiry.
- 4. We recommend that the documents be made publicly available in line with our assessment.
